"We had thought of God as a dispenser of all the good things we could possibly desire, but in a very

real sense, God has nothing to give to all except himself." (Simon Tugwell, Prayer: Living With God) I recently found this quote in Simon Tugwell's book, referenced above. This quote and its message have been running through my mind as I consider my prayer life—how I approach daily prayer and what I am seeking to get out of this activity. What do I want from God, and what do I expect in return? I do not know if I am alone in these thoughts. I imagine, if we are honest with ourselves, we may have asked these or similar questions about prayer and its benefits and why we make it an important part of our faith lives. Is it about seeking something in return for our time in God's presence or rather being with God and receiving what God knows we need and providing it without our asking? Through his words, Tugwell reminds us that prayer is best approached without a laundry list of "I want," or thoughts of what am I getting out of this relationship, and instead allow our singular motivation to be our realization of the longing need to abide with God. To be in the presence of the One who first loved us and wants to spend time with us as much as we want to spend our time with Him. We do not come to God because we want God to fix something in our lives or make a problem disappear. We approach God because we need the one-way love that only God offers. We need to know we are loved especially when we feel unlovable, and when we realize we cannot save ourselves and need a Savior

might already feel.

Tugwell reminds us that what God has for us is "himself,' and God has an endless amount of that to give us. Prayer is best approached by knowing that God knows far better than we do what we need and when we need it. Abiding with God means trusting the One who always has our best interests in mind and invites us into a safe and nurturing place. We need to show up and allow God to give us what we need instead of what we desire, and trust that God's love is sufficient to heal us and provide the new and restored life we need on God's terms, not ours.

May Stewardship: Aaron's Acres Embracing Possibilities Beyond Disabilities

Aaron's Acres is a Lancaster based non-profit committed to providing individuals with developmental disabilities ages 5 through 21 year-round age-appropriate therapeutically based recreation programs led by specially trained and certified staff in a supportive environment that enhances socialization and communication skills. Emotional and recreational support is offered for the entire family.

Aaron's Acres summer camp operates on the belief that every child should be able to experience the same recreational activities despite different ability levels. Supervisory staff is comprised of professionals (special education teachers) who have experience in working with children of all abilities. A low staff to child ratio (1:1 or 1:2) ensures that each child's needs are met immediately and appropriately. Lastly, a nurse is on staff to meet any medical needs that might arise.

Aaron's Acres summer camp provides children and young adults with activities ranging from arts and crafts to therapeutic horseback riding. Each day is packed with unique opportunities, including visits from therapy animals, magicians and music therapists, as well as pool time, and even the organization of a carnival. Children, regardless of disability, are able to take part in all activities offered at Aaron's Acres; everyone is a camper and everyone can have fun!

CHILD PROTECTION CLEARANCES NEEDED!

Thank you to everyone who calls Holy Trinity "home" and faithfully gives back to God's church by volunteering in any and all capacities. Our ministries would not be possible without your active and thoughtful stewardship.

Reminder, if you are planning to volunteer directly with or around children at Holy Trinity you need to complete a *Report of Criminal History* (PSP) clearance through the Pennsylvania State Police and a *Child Abuse History Clearance* through the PA Department of Human Services. Both of these clearances are free to volunteers and can be completed online for easy submission. Information regarding these is available in the church office. If your clearances are expiring you have already been contacted. You also must complete a *Reference Check for Applicant Seeking Approved Adult Status* and a *Child Protection Covenant*. Both of these are also available at the church office. All four of these documents are required by the church per our new child protection policy. To complete the latter two documents you will also need to include a photocopy of your valid PA State Driver's License. Vacation Bible School, Trini Mini Summer Camp, and other events are just around the corner, so please complete these clearances as soon as possible, if you have not already. These clearances not only protect the children to whom we minister they also protect volunteers and staff if legal action is taken against them and/or the church.

MOYER MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

The John H. Moyer and Erma R. Moyer Scholarship Trust of The Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Holy Trinity has been established through a gift by their son, John R. Moyer, to honor his parents and perpetuate the family's belief in the importance of higher education.

The Trust provides for a one-year scholarship of \$1,000.00 to be awarded annually to an active member of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church. As the investment grows, the Finance Committee can recommend to the Congregational Council increasing the amount. The Finance Committee will notify the Congregation Council in June each year of the amount available to be awarded so the Council can determine the number of scholarships that can be offered.

Applications and detailed Scholarship selection information can be obtained from the Church office. Completed applications and transcripts must be returned to the Church office no later than July 15. Congregation Council will approve all applicable scholarship applications. Scholarship checks will be produced and presented to each approved applicant in September.



New Bible Exploration

Continuing on Tuesdays you are invited to join in a study of the book of *Romans*. The study will take place each Tuesday morning from 11:00 AM to roughly 12:00 PM. "In his *Preface to Romans* Martin Luther writes, 'this epistle is really the chief part of the New Testament, and is truly the purest gospel...It is a bright light, almost sufficient to illuminate the entire Holy Scriptures'" (*Martin Luther's Basic Theological Writings*, second ed., Fortress, 2005 pp. 98-99). *Romans* is also the most challenging of the Pauline epistles and will likely provide those participating with significant, in-depth discussion and new ideas to chew on as we wade

through it and learn and grow together in our faith lives and our relationships with God and our Lord. There will be sign-up sheet in the Gathering Area for those who are interested in participating.
